Gas station vote delayed

Commissioners postpone controversial hearing, but offer hope that Florida Forever may buy the property

Hundreds of people showed up from around the region to express their concerns about a proposed gas station to be located near known underground caves that flow to Wakulla Springs. But only 95 people could get into the county commission chambers, leaving about 150 people to swelter in the heat outside.

After 30 minutes, expressing concern about the citizens outside, the county commission voted unanimously to postpone the controversial comp plan amendment for another day and another venue.

And then Commission Chairman Ralph Thomas dropped the bombshell that he has been working with state Rep. Jason Shoaf (R-Port St. Joe) to try the land purchased by the Florida Forever Fund.



The commission meeting room was full and an overflow of about 150 people were forced to stay outside. Complaints about heat and not being able to hear the meeting outside like commissioners to postpone the controversial issue.

Thomas was optimistic about the possibility.

Some citizens were too. Eugene Watkins, usually a harsh critic of the commission, called it a "glorious moment."

Some citizens, such as Kellie Keys and former commissioner Lynn Artz, suggested that if the state did buy the land it would be perfect as a park with with exhibits explaining the underground cave system or a welcome center for Wakulla.

Other citizens ex

pressed support, but warned that the state's money for land buying has been cut and not to count too much on that solution.

One citizen, Claudia Sperber of Tallahassee, said she was "profoundly supportive" of the land being

purchased by the state but worried it's not guaranteed.

Southwest Georgia Oil Co., which operates Inland gas stations, has proposed a 16-pump station and car wash at the corner of U.S. Highway 319 and Bloxham Cutoff.

Controversy arises from the fact that the Wakulla Karst Plain Project, which studies the underground cave connections, has mapped a tunnel under portions of the property that flows directly to Wakulla Springs.

How to protect the underground cave system has been the crux of the controversy.

Southwest Georgia had first made the proposal a year ago, it was voted down by the planning commission and then the company withdrew it in February right before it was to be heard by county commissioners. Then-county commissioner Randy Merritt announced that he would have had no choice but to vote for the gas station and charged staff to find a legal basis to vote no.

Staff initially thought of setbacks from the underground caves, but the caves are 100 to 200 feet underground and there's

Promise Land Ministries, located at 20 Church Road, close to Shell Point, is a faithbased recovery center. Pastor Glen Hamel and his wife Vera, have devoted their lives to serving the rejected, hurting, abused, and addicted.

Pastor Glen also leads Real Church, a non-denominational church located at 3167 Coastal Highway in Crawfordville.

Ed Layton, now Executive Director to Promise
Land and Yard Services

Manager, was once in the transition program for men himself. Proudly, Layton shared his testimony to show others overcoming addiction can be done.

"I went into the Program in 2008," Layton says. "When I came to Promise Land, I was living on the streets, I had issues and problems functioning, I was on drugs, on alcohol, I lost everything – I was tired of it. After going through detox, I reached out to Glen.

"I originally planned on hanging out in the ministry long enough to get myself together and I was going to leave, just like an addict would, get a few meals in my stomach and go," Layton says. "But something happened, I found myself happy with the ministry, I was content, I was happy, the structure of the ministry is something I needed. I was in a place where people cared about me. I got so involved with the ministry, I graduated the program in 8 months. "After being involved."

"After being involved, doors opened, and I dedicated myself to Jesus. Where I once thought I wouldn't be able to make it, I know now that life will always have its bumps, but this time,

Welding facility to be named for late Roscoe Grant

The Wakulla County School Board voted 4-1 to name the Wakulla High School welding facility after longtime vocational instructor Roscoe Grant.

The vote, at the school board's July 24 meeting, was supported by Chair Melisa Taylor, and members Josh Brown, Cale Langston and Laura Lawhon. School board member Eddie Hand cast the lone dissenting vote, but did not explain why. Hand did question Superintendent Bobby Pearce about what other school facilities are named for people – and Pearce pointed to numerous athletic facilities: the football field and stadium, the track,

the baseball field, and the tennis courts.

Pearce also praised Grant for his work on Wakulla vocational programs and credited his work with bringing in \$20 million in new vocational funding for the high school from Triumph Gulf Coast.

Grant was 66 years old when he died on June

Grant's teaching at Wakulla High was through an agreement with Lively Vo-Tech in Tallahassee.

Purple passionflower (Passiflora incarnata) is a native vine that can climb or sprawl. Its large, fantastical fringed flowers could have been drawn by Dr. Seuss. Its 3-lobed leaves feed the voracious caterpillars of numerous butterflies, including gulf fritillary, zebra longwing, crimson patch longwing, and red-banded hairstreak. Flowers are followed by a green, leathery fruit that turns yellow when ripe and "pops" when crushed. Ripened maypops can be eaten or made into jelly. Purple passionflower is a rambunctious climber, and its roots can spread aggressively. One of six Passiflora species native to Florida, purple passionflower grows in much of the state. However, numerous cultivars and non-natives are sold, sometimes as native. Purple passionflower can be found near the west picnic pavilion at Sopchoppy Depot Park.



no way for a surveyor above ground to put up stakes with red flags to demarcate where the edge of the tunnel is and thus where the setback would begin.

The county staff and a consultant came up with a proposed ordinance that would require more soil testing and other work on sites, and that would look at the location of gas underground storage tanks.

County Administrator David Edwards told commissioners that, in a meeting with theattorneys with the general counsel of state Department of Environmental Protection, he and other county officials were told that the county could not preempt state regulation of storage tanks. The meeting was also attended by County Attorney Heather Encinosa and

other county staff.

The county ended up

dropping the ordinance. After some DEP officials denied they stopped the county's ordinance, Edwards has been lambasted in some state media for allegedly lying to commissioners.

Some citizens groups got together and tried to write an ordinance to protect the underground cave systems, but commissioners rejected it, saying it relied on ordinances from other counties that have setbacks from aboveground features - cave openings, for example - but did not solve the problem of how to do a setback from something 100 to 200 feet underground.

But the way commissioners rejected it drew some scorn: At the meeting on July 17, Commissioner Chuck Hess made a motion to approve, and Chairman Thomas asked

for a second or a second for discussion and none of the other three commissioners would make such a motion.

When the matter died for a lack of second, citizens erupted in anger many yelling and pointing fingers, there was

a brief sit-in, and three people were escorted out by a deputy, including Jack Rudloe of Gulf Specimen Marine Lab in Panacea. (Rudloe had his no trespass order lifted and was able to attend the commission meeting on Monday, Aug. 4.)

At Monday night's meeting, county officials were well-aware that the matter would draw a crowd and that the meeting room size is limited. (Edwards had told the Sun last week that there was possibility that the meeting could be moved

to the community center if the crowd was big. That didn't happen because the attorney noted that some items on the agenda had been noticed for the commission chambers, not the community center.)

Ninety-five people were allowed in, counted off by Fire Chief Louis Lamarche, and everybody else had to stay out in the heat.

County staff had set up several tents, there was cold water and a big fan. TV monitors had been set up to provide those outside with a way to follow what was happening inside.

But commissioners called a recess 30 minutes into the meeting out of concern for what was happening outside, and they unanimously agreed to postpone the gas station issue and hold it at a later date in a larger venue, presumably the community center.

It's not clear when the matter will be reset.

BIRDING AT THE REFUGE

Brave the heat for August birding

By DON MORROW

August at St. Marks NWR serves to transition the refuge from the lethal heat of July into the sullen heat of September. August needs to be endured if we are ever to reach the faintly-remembered cool weather of Fall.

It was already in the low 80s as I walked out the Double Dikes under a mostly-full moon. I was trying to get to the end of the dike before sunrise. The Eastern sky was painted in swaths of pink and pale smoky blue. Pig Frogs were grunting randomly from the marshes along the dike and the large white blooms of pine hibiscus stood out in the predawn light.

I had scared off a Great Horned Owl as I pulled in to park and added a calling Least Bittern and two fly-by Wood Ducks to my list, while slapping at hordes of mosqui-

toes and biting flies. I walked out on the North dike. It is higher and has better marsh views. It can be good for nightbirds like rails, owls, and nighthawks. My plan was to return on the South dike. It parallels the North dike and would bring me back to my car. Also, it's lower and would provide a good vantage point for shorebirds on Stony

I made it out just before sunrise and set my scope up to scan Stony Bayou. Yellow Warblers were moving through the brush along the edge of the dikes. Yellow Warblers are a common Fall migrant at the refuge. They start coming through in July and won't finish passing through until early November. Out on the Stony Bayou mudflats there were scattered waders, Great Blue, Little Blue & Tricol- vou will see seasonal

with Great and Snowy Egrets. A large group of Roseate Spoonbills were gathered around two white pelicans. The spoonbills and pelicans have been hanging out together for a few weeks. There was also a flamingo.

I walked back along the dike scoping for shorebirds. They were widely scattered. I found Black-bellied, Wilson's and Semi- is hot and there are palmated Plovers. Two of the black-bellies were in breeding plumage, indicating early migrants back from the arctic. There were Short-billed Dowitchers, Willets, both Greater & Lesser Yellowlegs, as well as. Least and Semipalmated Sandpipers. I found a single Stilt Sandpiper, another early migrant passing through from the Arctic on its way to South America for the winter.

If you brave the heat, ored Herons along change occurring at

St. Marks. Partridge Pea is in flower and the first ripening berries of Virginia Creeper are attracting Mockingbirds. Migratory Black Saddlebag dragonflies have shown up. Come early and you may even see a bobkitten following its mother. Life is in full progress at St. Marks, despite the

August at St. Marks biting insects. However, there are also late-summer wildflowers and every day brings new migrant birds. Horsemint will start blooming this month and both Bald Eagles and Bluewinged Teal will return later in the month.


If you must endure August, you might as well come down to the refuge. Don't worry, August never lasts more than a month..



Underwater Wakulla By Rusty Miller

Dive season is just getting better.

Hello Wakulla

It's the last day of July 2023 and the dive season is starting to wind down for the out-of-towner who come to enjoy our waters for a few days or even weeks.

For those of us who make Florida our permanent home the dive season is just getting better. The water is a balmy 88-91 degrees while in the deeper water (at 50-feet plus it's down to 85-87

On my last dive I told you about the whale shark that we swam with at the Navy Barge. Since then they have reported the sighting of at least four more whale sharks in the different dive sites like the Black Bart, Red Sea, and the Lost Pontoon to name a few. It looks like they may be here for a little while because of the large plankton bloom we are seeing. I recommend you book a dive trip over in Panama City Beach soon and the odds are pretty good you will see one or two of them.

I will say that on my last few dives the water visibility was not the best I've seen, it was 25-35 feet. But I'm sure that as the days go on it should get better.

As we start August we need to understand that the water will become more unpredictable because of the weather patterns farther out in the Gulf. The water will get a little warmer and that could mean some severe weather to start forming. There is also a possibility that it might not be that bad.

There have been dives lately that when we get to the dive site the waves are 1-foot or less but by the time we finish the dive they have gone to 2-feet or more so be very vigilant when you go out into the big water.

The second dive after we swam with the whale shark was the Red Sea. The visibility was about 35 feet but the water temperature was 88 degrees from the surface to about 55 feet then it dropped to about 84 degrees to the bottom.

Both the mother and daughter went on that dive while I observed. They swam all over the wreck until their gas got down to about 1200psi and we headed to our safety stop.

The 3rd and final dive was the Lost Pontoon, it was in about 60 feet of water and the visibility was about the same. That is where they collected a lot of nice shells and sand dollars.

They really enjoyed themselves and I really enjoyed being able to introduce them to the life under the ocean.

Until next week blow bubbles and dive safe.

Weekly Roundup: High school psych out

TALLAHASSEE — Another clash between state education officials and the College Board popped off this week, as the organization said Florida's restrictions on instruction about sexual orientation and gender identity have "effectively banned" an Advanced Placement psychology course.

The College Board, which develops the college-level courses offered to high-school students, said Florida superintendents were informed Thursday that content in the course violates state law.

"We are sad to have learned that today the Florida Department of Education has effectively banned AP Psychology in the state by instructing Florida superintendents that teaching foundational content on sexual orientation and gender identity is illegal under state law. The state has said districts are free to teach AP Psychology only if it excludes any mention of these essential topics," the College Board said in a press release.

Gov. Ron DeSantis in May signed a law that bars instruction on sexual orientation and gender identity for Florida students in prekindergarten through eighth grade.

Separately, the state Board of Education earlier this summer approved a rule that

sexual orientation and gender identity instruction in high school, unless lessons are required by state academic standards or are "part of a reproductive health course or health lesson for which a student's parent has the option to have his or her student not attend."

The AP course "asks students to 'describe how sex and gender influence socialization and other aspects of development.' This element of the framework is not new: gender and sexual orientation have been part of AP Psychology since the course launched 30 years ago," the College Board's release said.

College Board, more than 28,000 Florida students took the AP Psychology course last school year. The 2023-2024 academic year starts as early as next week for some Florida school districts.

The state education department, however, pushed back on the College Board's assertion that the course was banned.

"Just one week before school starts, the College Board is attempting to force school districts to prevent students from taking the AP Psychology Course. The Department didn't 'ban' the course. The course remains listed in Florida's Course Code Directory for the 2023-24 school year.

> At least one of Florida's largest school districts has advised parents and students that the course would not be available for the coming school year.

> The Orange County school district on Thursday notified the community that AP Psychology "is no longer a potential course option" for students.

The dispute over the AP Psychology course is not the first time According to the DeSantis and state education officials have clashed with the College Board. In January, the state objected to several topics that were proposed for inclusion in an AP African American studies course that was being developed.

> The controversy over the African American studies course prompted DeSantis, who is running for president, to say that the state would "look to re-evaluate" its relationship with the organization.

BATTLE FOR THE **BALLOT**

Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody this week intensified the legal battle to keep a proposed constitutional amendment that would authorize recreational use of marijuana off the ballot in 2024.

In a brief filed Wednesday, lawyers for Moody said the measure "misleads" voters in a way to benefit the state's largest medical-marijuana operator, Trulieve.

Tallahassee-based Trulieve has contributed all but a fraction of the nearly \$40 million raised by the Smart & Safe Florida political committee for the proposed "Adult Use of Marijuana" initiative, which would go on the 2024 ballot.

Attorneys representing Moody, the Florida Chamber of Commerce and the Drug Free America Foundation have filed briefs arguing the Supreme Court should reject the proposal.

Moody's office argued in Wednesday's brief that the measure would help Trulieve continue its dominance in Florida's legal cannabis market.

"This carefully curated ballot summary misleads in ways that, though sometimes subtle, are likely to influence voters — and to do so in a way that entrenches the sponsor's monopolistic stranglehold on the marijuana market to the detriment of Floridians. The initiative should be stricken," state Solicitor General Henry Whitaker wrote in the brief.

Trulieve defended the proposal, which has drawn briefs in support from the American Civil Liberties Union of Florida, the Florida Medical Marijuana Business As-

sociation and the Cato Institute.

"The ballot language is clear, states the chief purpose of the amendment and — without a doubt — covers one and only one subject. For these reasons, we trust the court will agree that the voters of Florida should have the opportunity to vote to allow adults in Florida the freedom to use cannabis for their personal consumption," Trulieve said in a statement Wednesday.

The proposal needs ultimate approval from the Florida Supreme Court. Under the Florida Constitution, ballot initiatives must not be confusing to voters and address a single subject.

As homeowners continue flooding into the state-backed Citizens Property Insurance Corp., regulators this week approved proposals that could lead to private insurers pulling as many as 184,000 policies from Citizens starting in October.

The move came after Citizens last week hit a total of 1,345,403 policies, compared to 486,773 at the end of July 2020.

Insurance Commissioner Michael Yaworsky signed orders Monday approving the proposals by Slide Insurance Co., Safepoint Insurance Co., Southern Oak Insurance Co., Florida Peninsula Insurance Co. and Monarch National Insur-

ance Co.

Slide received approval to assume as many as 100,000 Citizens policies, by far the largest amount, according to the orders posted on the state Office of Insurance Regulation website. Safepoint could take as many as 30,000 policies; Southern Oak, 25,000 policies; Florida Peninsula, 19,000 policies; and Monarch, 10,000 policies. Each could start pulling policies from Citizens on Oct. 17.

Florida leaders have long sought to shift policies from Citizens into the private market, in part because of financial risks if the state gets hit by a major hurricane or multiple hurricanes.

School bus safety for bus riders Many students take the bus to school twice a day, five days a week. Approximately 26 million elementary and secondary school children ride school buses daily in the United States, and the U.S. Department of their seat without making a fuss.

Transportation says more than 50 percent of all K-12 students in the country ride yellow school buses, traveling approximately 4 billion miles each year. The vast majority of these miles are traveled without incident. In fact, according to the National Safety Council, the national school bus accident rate is 0.01 per 100 miles traveled, compared to 0.96 for other passenger vehicles, which makes school buses considerably safer than other passenger

Though school buses are safe, there are other ways to make them even safer. Children, especially those new to school buses, may find the bus fun and unique and not pay attention to simple safety rules. But parents should take steps to ensure that youngsters always heed the

following school bus safety guidelines. • Wait for the bus in a safe location that is away from traffic, ideally staying

- in a designated school bus stop until the bus arrives. • Dress for optimal visibility, especially in inclement weather when it can be
- difficult for the school bus driver and other motorists to see pedestrians. • Do not board the bus until it comes to a complete stop. Wait for the driver
- to open the door, which engages the "Stop" sign for oncoming motorists.

• Use the handrail and enter the bus in an orderly manner.

• Promptly find a seat, sit down and buckle the safety belt if there is one available. Students assigned seats on the bus should take

• Keep backpacks and other belongings out of the center aisle. Store them under your seat or on your lap.

• Remain seated at all times while the bus is in motion.


