Tangible Personal Property: All Wakulla County businesses were mailed a notice to file their 2023 Tangible Personal Returns in January. All businesses must submit an updated return, even if the business received exempt notices in prior years.

If your business has not filed your 2023 return, you still have time to file with an extension. Please visit our web site www.mywakullapa.com to download the extension application and submit the completed extension form along with your 2023 return.

Why are we asking all businesses to submit an updated TPP return? Bottom line...our records need updating. We have businesses who have never filed a return, businesses who have not updated their returns and closed businesses still on the books! In other words, TPP has not been a priority in the past several years.

Our office is committed to follow Florida Statutes. Florida Statue 193.052 requires all businesses, regardless of size, to report their assets to the Property Appraiser by April 1 of each year. By submitting a timely return, each business is automatically granted a \$25,000 exemption from the depreciated asset value. Failure to file a return can trigger the loss of this exemption.

Wakulla County is a fiscally constrained county, which means Wakulla County receives State revenue to fund local government services. The formula for extra state funding includes all the TPP exemptions. Last year this funding was well over \$1,000,000, so it is important for this office to track and report all TPP exemptions. Even if your business has less than \$25,000 in business assets, you need to file a TPP return. You will owe no local taxes; however, the state will provide additional funds based on the exempted totals.

Please join me in congratulating Chuck Turner, our TPP and AG Appraiser, for earning a Certified Florida Evaluator designation from the Florida Department of Revenue. This was awarded after 120 hours of class, passing four strenuous exams, and two years of service in this office.

2023 is flying by! Our office was very busy the past couple of months.

We made it through our statutory March 1st deadline for all exemptions and agriculture classifications to be applied for. Don't worry though, if you missed the deadline, please contact our office immediately, either in person or with a phone call, to submit a late application. Florida Statutes gives me wide latitude to evaluate each late application and

I may be able to approve yours.

Community outreach is important. We have recently found several families who were paying hundreds of dollars in extra taxes because they didn't know of exemptions they qualified for. I want to make sure every exemption is taken advantage of. This office strives to highlight every legal exemption so your taxable value will be as low as possible.

Someone from our staff attends Realtor's county's frontline experts know as much as possible as they work with buyers and sellers. We routinely discuss topics such as homestead exemption, portability, property value trends, agriculture, mapping, navigating our website, tangible personal property, parcel records, etc.

While our Realtors meet every month, we are available to any group of people who want to learn more about our office.

Another way we have extended our informational reach is to improve and increase our presence on social media. Growing our social media presence over the last couple of years has been impactful. around his senior year of high school. Miller notes that he felt like he was missing a passion.

In his search for a new passion, Miller rekindled his love for music. "I've always loved music," says Miller, who shared that he found a love for writing and poetry in middle school - he wanted to combine poems with melodies. When he first started to explore music, his grandfather Stan Tucker allowed him to learn on an acoustic guitar, and his friend Brandon Autrey encouraged him - especially, when learning was difficult.

After marrying his wife Amanda, Miller moved to Tallahassee in 2016. In July 2017, the couple moved to Nashville. Miller says that his goal in moving to Nashville was to "wake up everyday and do something with music." As luck would have it, he found a job within the music industry.

Miller joined a Young Entertainment Professionals Facebook group, and eventually found a post from fellow founding member of Highway Natives Brandon Moore who was looking to see if anyone was interested in co-writing. Miller reached out and the two met in downtown Nashville, not realizing that they actually lived near each other. That initial meeting led to Miller and Moore spending a year

writing songs and having jam sessions together.

In 2019. Miller and Moore officially formed an American rock band called Highway Natives, and they were eventually joined by Artie Scarazzo, Arthur Stover, and Matt Drummey.

According to Miller, being on stage is only a couple of hours - the rest is being in a van traveling to venues and hanging out with each other. He says that some of his favorite memories of his time with the band are of being in the van, conversing, and getting to know everyone.

"You have to be a good hang," he says in regard to being in Nashville and being in a band.

Miller says that the creation of the band happened naturally, and that he has truly found a family among his fellow band members.

"These guys have made me feel like I'm doing what I'm supposed to be doing."

In February, Highway Natives performed at a few events in Wakulla, including at the ribbon-cutting for the business of family friend Brian English at his new offices for English Financial, and adding a fundraiser show for the new Wakulla Community Theater at Sopchoppy School.

"I would like to thank everybody who had us be a part of their events," Miller says, adding he was happy to be home. "There was a big sense of

entrapped in the devils snare!


With conscience dumbed down, and seared. They were blinded to the signs, when they first appeared.

Pointing fingers using 'you' statement builds resentments. Let go of grudges being able to forgive can dramatically decrease anger. To err is human but to forgive divine. Use humor it can go a long way; lowering the intensity of the moment.

What to bring to Household Hazardous Waste Day...

Bring your household cleaners - such as oven cleaners, wood/metal cleaner or polishers, toilet bowl cleaners, disinfectants, drain openers. Automotive products - such as additives, solvents, refrigerants, starter fluid, body putty, anti-freeze, gasoline, diesel, kerosene. Home Improvement Products - such as non-latex paints, paint thinner, paint stripper/remover, adhesives.

Lawn & Garden Products - such as recyclable batteries (automotive batteries, lithium-ion batteries, button cell batteries, phone batteries, nickel batteries, battery packs, power tool batteries), herbicides, pesticides, fungicides, wood preserver.

Miscellaneous Hazardous Items - such as nail polish remover, fluorescents, photo developing chemicals, pool chemicals, aerosols/compressed gas, reactive materials. Televisions will be accepted at this time, but NO OLD TUBE TVs.

Wakulla County Sheriff's Office will be accepting presciptions and ammunition. Please note that they will not be taking sharps.

No Latex Paint * No Household Alkaline Batteries * No Oil * No Household Trash • Free disposal of oil at the landfill • Paint will be limited to 5 gallons per resident (Latex can be dried and put in trash) • Small electronics can be donated to Goodwill or deposited in your trash. • Household alkaline batteries need to be placed in a container and placed in your trash (i.e. milk jug, plastic bottle, etc.)

Bulk Waste Service

- 1. Residential bulk items will be picked up on normal trash routes. Citizens do not have to schedule with Waste Pro. For residential bulk pick-up, place the items out with your trash can.
- 2. Waste Pro asks citizens to place out only 1-2 bulky items per week (not to exceed 2 yards (approximate size of a refrigerator)., as space on the trucks is limited.
- 3. Metal items still must be scheduled through Waste Pro, 850-926-7010.
- 4. Waste Pro still does not service yard waste or anything that is considered construction debris.
- 5. If residential bulk items are not picked up within three days of your regularly scheduled trash day, and no notice as to why has been given, contact the Wakulla County Public Works Department at 850-926-7616

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
