

Roth IRA for kids

Tax-free and penalty-free withdrawals can also be taken under certain other circumstances, such as the owner's death.

The original Roth IRA owner is not required to take minimum annual withdrawals.

is the coyotes. Have you noticed the turkey population has dwindled? I saw a publication by the state Fish and Wildife Conservation Commission last week that they have seen a decrease in turkeys statewide. Where I live there are virtually no turkevs left. I haven't seen or heard one here in the past couple of years.

The big killers of turkeys statewide are coyotes and raccoons. Given the opportuniturkeys, but they can wipe out a whole population eating the eggs in the nesting season which is not to far off. We hunters can help reduce the loss of eggs and hatched chick kills. They also can be hunted day and night year round on private

lands.

Coyotes also kill dogs, cats, chickens, deer and farmer's young livestock. That's why you see donkeys roaming the fields with cattle. Donkeys will chase and even kill covotes.

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

The Lifetime Learning Credit

that time again...tax time! As we all prepare our returns for the current tax season, we may be looking for credits that can help us possibly reduce our tax liability.

The Lifetime Learning Credit is a tax credit offered by the United States federal government to help taxpayers offset the costs associated with higher education and certain development skill courses.

Unlike some otheducation tax credits, the Lifetime Learning Credit is available for an unlimited number of years and is not restricted to undergraduate students. It is intended to support individuals

pursuing post-secondary education, including graduate and professional degree programs, as well as courses to acquire or improve job skills.

Some of the key features of the Lifetime Learning Credit include:

Credit amount. The Lifetime Learning Credit allows eligible taxpayers to claim a tax credit of up to \$2,000 per tax return. The credit amount is calculated as 20% of the first \$10,000 of qualified education expenses paid for all eligible students.

Eligible expenses. Qualified education expenses for the Lifetime Learning Credit include tuition, fees, and required course materials that are necessary for enrollment or attendance at an eligible educational institution. However, expenses for room sential supplies are the Lifetime Learngenerally not eligible ing Credit must for the credit.

Income

The Lifetime Learning Credit begins to phase out for taxpayers with modified adjusted gross incomes (MAGI) above certain thresholds. For the current tax year, the phase-out range starts at \$80,000-\$90,000 for single filers and \$160,000-\$180,000 combined income for joint returns. Taxpayers with MAGI exceeding these thresholds may still be eligible for a reduced credit amount, depending on their specific circumstances.

Non-refundable credit. It is important to note that the Lifetime Learning Credit is a non-refundable credit, meaning it can only be used to offset federal income tax liabilities. If the amount of the credit exceeds the taxpayer's tax liability, the excess credit cannot be refunded.

maintain accurate limits. records and documentation of their qualified education expenses, including receipts, invoices, and statements from the educational institution. Providing adequate documentation is essential to support the claim in case of an audit by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Overall, the Lifetime Learning Credit provides valuable financial assistance to individuals pursuing higher education and skill development opportunities. By offsetting a portion of the expenses associated with post-secondary education, the credit helps make education more accessible and affordable for taxpayers across diverse backgrounds and life stages.

Parking issues at boat ramps in the county

From the Desk of Sheriff Miller:

Spring is almost here, though this year it seems that Mother Nature can't make up her mind what season it is.

With spring and warmer weather comes an opportunity to get out and enjoy some of the many outdoor activities there are in our wonderful county.

One of the more

popular activities in Wakulla enjoying our ample access to rivers and the Gulf via boating. I wanted to take some time this month to discuss an issue that comes up every year in the spring and summer around this topic and that is boat parking.

Currently there are about five popularly used county maintained public boat ramps in Wakulla, along with others maintained by the City of St. Marks, and Sopchoppy.

Specifically, the boat ramps at Lower Bridge, St. Marks, Shell Point, and Mashes Sands are some of the most popular places for people to utilize for boating during the warmer months of the year

However with each of these particular locations, there is also limited space available for those who wish to use them. Every year parking becomes a significant problem at these areas.

Often times patrons to these boat ramps solve this issue by parking outside of the designated areas, along the roadside, or on private property.

While I certainly understand the frustration with the parking difficulties, and the desire to get your car parked and get out on the water. Parking your vehicle outside of the designated spaces puts you at risk for potential consequences.

Parking on the shoulder of the roadway is a violation of state law and may

However with each result in a traffic cithese particular lotions, there is also the registered owner of the vehicle.

Likewise any vehicle that is parked, where part of the vehicle or trailer is in any way still in the roadway is a violation.

In this scenario the owner may not only be ticketed but have their vehicle towed at their expense. It's important to know that this includes designated bike paths, such as the one at Mashes Sands as well. Additionally it is not uncommon for would-be boaters who cannot find an official parking spot to pull onto a nearby seemingly unoccupied private property. Parking on private property without the permission of the property owner may also result in the offending vehicle and trailer being towed at the owners expense.

Lastly, parking within the designated parking lots, but doing so in a way that impedes or blocks traffic to other users, may result in the offending vehicle being towed.

It should be noted that in the scenarios listed above the decision to tow or not tow a vehicle, is based on the safety of others using the roadway, owners request etc., not in an effort to punish any individual.

Over the past several years Wakulla County has dedicated quite a bit of resources into improving the boat ramps and parking areas providing better access to Wakulla County's wa-

terways. With that improvement has come an increased interest in them from both residents and nonresidents.

This is certainly a positive for our county over all, improving both quality of life for residents and helping our local economy.



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The St. Marks River towns

Chapter Three

Apparently the town of St. Marks did not profit from the decline of Magnolia.

According to an article in the July 1876 issue of the Semitropical Magazine, St. Marks, in expectation of having the railroad and the resultant prosperity, laid out new streets, built some fine residences, planted fine gardens and set out shade trees to add to its attractions.

"But," says the article, "the railroad company held the cards and St. Marks saw with dismay the iron horse dash across the river seeking cheap government land to retail in costly town lots."

Thus "Port Leon was born with the sole advantage of being three miles nearer New York."

We can readily believe that only getting 10 acres of land in the vicinity of the old fort, instead of the 100 acres asked for, was the chief reason the railroad company extended its line down the river.* That it expected to build a town and profit from selling land to settlers is indicated by the following advertisement appearing in the Pensacola Gazette of December 21, 1839:

SALE OF LOTS IN PORT LEON

On Monday, January 13, 1840, will be offered for sale, at auction, a part of the lots in Port Leon. This town is situated on Apalachie Bay, about 3 miles by the river, below St. Marks. It is handsomely located on the most elevated site on the bay, and with the exception of the ground near the bay, is beyond the influence of the highest tides.



*In the Tuesday, February 18, 1964 issue of The Tallahassee Democrat, a news article stated the State Cabinet released \$30,000 to Wakulla County for the purpose of buying up privately owned property around the site of Ft. St. Marks in preparation for a state historical monument. (So little have times changed, but prices have gone up.) The 1963 Florida Legislative Session voted a sum of \$100,000 towards creating the monument and adjoining recreational park. Meanwhile, the Wakulla County Commissioners have cleared off the land and built an access road to the remains of the old Magnolia Cemetery two miles north of Newport.


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
