There was a big crowd on hand at the community center on Friday night for Keep Wakulla County Beautiful's award dinner.

Incoming KWCB president Steve Cushman presented his idea of "Just Imagine" - a new focus for the group away from Reduce, Reuse and Recycle to a reduction of waste. "Just stop," he said. He bemoaned the consumer culture of "Buy now" that produces enormous waste.

Cushman said the focus should be on "how much we as human beings consume... and where those products end up when we're done with them."

Speaker Kelli Keys, an adjunct professor at FSU, echoed that sentiment as well noting that the promise of recycling - especially plastics - is largely greenwashing. "Less than 9% of all plastics ever produced have been recycled," Keys said, adding that 8 to 11 million tons of plastics go into the ocean every year.

Cal Jamison, formerly Wakulla Springs Ambassador who has extensive knowledge of the local sinkholes, spoke about the recent effort of removing a car from a local sinkhole. The car, a 1970s Datsun, had been in the sinkhole

Scallop season opened July 1 in **Wakulla waters**

The 2025 recreational bay scallop season from Franklin County through northwestern Taylor County (including Carrabelle, Lanark and St. Marks) as well as portions of Levy County and all of Citrus and Hernando counties (including Cedar Key, Crystal River and Homosassa) opened July 1 and will remain open through Sept. 24.

The daily bag limit in these areas is 2 gallons of whole bay scallops in the shell or 1 pint of bay scallop meat per person, with a maximum of 10 gallons of whole bay scallops in the shell or 1/2 gallon (4 pints) shucked bay scallop meat per vessel per day.

Throughout the season and region-wide, vessel limits do not allow an individual to exceed their personal bag limit.

Harvest of bay scallops is permitted only by hand or by using a landing or dip net. Commercial harvest is prohibited.

Although bay scallop season dates can vary by region, regulations do allow the direct and continuous transit of legally harvested bay scallops through closed areas. When transiting, boaters may not stop their vessels in waters that are closed to harvest and instead must proceed directly to the dock or ramp to land scallops in a closed area.

Recreational harvesters need a Florida saltwater fishing license to harvest bay scallops unless they are exempt from needing a license or have a no-cost shoreline fishing license and are wading from shore to collect scallops (i.e., feet do not leave the bottom to swim, snorkel, or SCUBA and harvesters do not use a vessel to reach or return from the harvest location).

Attention is on alligators, ICE

TALLAHASSEE — Amid what Gov. Ron DeSantis called the "sauna stage of Tallahassee weather," attention shifted this week to a proposed migrant detention center in the Everglades and speculation about what the governor will redline from the state's 2025-26 budget.

During an appearance Thursday in Boca Raton, DeSantis downplayed the Legislature's \$115.1 billion spending plan as not delivering "any type of sea change" while later acknowledging "there's a lot to go through" as he preps his veto pen.

The state budget (SB 2500), along with a tax package (HB 7031) and various implementing and conforming bills, were delivered to DeSantis on Friday. The next fiscal year begins on Tuesday.

"There obviously will be vetoes," DeSantis said Thursday. Other unsigned bills will be handled "over the next three or four days," the governor added.

"And at that point we will have the fiscal year 2025-26 budget in place, and people can go and do their thing," he said.

Flower of the Week at Sopchoppy Depot Park Skyflower

The brilliant blue flowers of skyflower (Hydrolea corymbosa) stand out in summer. Clusters of 5-petaled, somewhat cup-shaped flowers face skyward early in the day, then fade as the day progresses. Anthers covered with bright orange pollen and long filaments add to the beauty of the blooms. Bees are the main pollinators though a few butterflies may visit. Skyflowers grow 1-2 feet tall in full sun and wet to moist organic soil. This wetland wildflower spreads slowly through underground rhizomes. It occurs naturally in freshwater marshes, swamps, ponds, ditches, and wet pine flatwoods. Found almost exclusively in Florida, skyflower is common to Florida's peninsula and a few panhandle counties including Wakulla. Few notice the plant until the stunning blooms appear. Skyflower is blooming now in the pond at Sopchoppy Depot Park.



Don't eliminate county recycling service

The article on Property Values in last week's Sun ("Property values up 9.5%," June 19) mentioned that Wakulla County has proposed to eliminate its recycling program since only 20% of customers participate. I suggest that instead of eliminating recycling, the County should try to increase participation.

Curbside recycling is not just a "feel good" service, there are cost benefits to County residents. I visited the Marpan recycling facility last year and was told

they have buyers for all the recycled materials and their operation is profitable.

Recycling reduces landfill tipping fees and extends the landfill life, delaying expansion costs ultimately paid for by customers.

Unless the county has performed a detailed cost evaluation that shows otherwise, increasing participation seems to be a better option than eliminating recycling.





Four .380 Caliber Small Handguns



By MARJ LAW

Helen wants to purchase a .380. She is new to shooting and wants to be able to defend herself. She has talked to friends who have handguns. Most of them have told her the .22 doesn't have enough "take-down" power, so they have suggested a .380.

But which one?

She wonders: "Which 380 shoots the best? Which one fits my needs? Which is easiest to load? Has the lightest slide? Easiest trigger pull? Least weight? The only way I'll know is to shoot some .380s first, but how do I do that?"

At the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office range recently, I took Helen to try out four .380 caliber handguns, some donated by friends, and a couple are our own. They are the:

Sig Sauer P365 380, Sig Sauer P238, Ruger Security 380,

The Smith & Wesson M&P Shield .380 EZ.

Helen looks at the four

handguns.

"Two of them are

substantially smaller than the other two," she says. "They're lighter, too. They would fit in my purse, and I could wear them in holsters. The 365 is 5.8" long and it weighs 15.7 ounces. The 238 is 5.5" long and it weighs 15.2 ounces. So, the 365 is a bit longer and heavier than the 238, but I can easily carry either one in my purse."

"The other two I could wear in holsters, but I wouldn't put them in my purse. The Ruger and the Shield are larger than the 365 or the 238. The Ruger is 6.52" long and it weighs 19.7 ounces. The Shield is 6.7" long, and it weighs 18.3 ounces."

"What about grip?" I

"I shot the most accurately with the 365," she says happily. "The Shield did well, too. The Ruger even hit the x-ring once. Maybe if I practice more, I'll do well with the Ruger. And the 238 is the smallest and the lightest for my purse. Which would I choose?" She looks at me like I might have the answer.

"You must choose the gun you like the best. Which gun fits your needs best?"

"Okay. Let me think." After a moment she has the answer.





Coast Guard Auxiliary Reports By Carolyn Brown Treadon



On June 23, the Coast Guard Auxiliary celebrated its 86th birthday. This story can be found on the Coast Guard Auxiliary website:

Boating always has been one of America's favorite pastimes and entered the sport arena in the early 19th Century. Rowing and yachting races were among the most popular spectator sports through the 1930s. The wealth generated in post-Civil War America, along with the growth of railroads, spurred the development of resorts, country homes, and the suburbs, all places to go boating.

The Federal Government began to construct large dams, reservoirs, and lake systems during the Depression, adding waterways.

With the development of the single operator motorboat and the outboard engine at the turn of the 20th Century, the number of recreational boaters skyrocketed. In 1939, the Coast Guard reported that there were more than 300,000 boats operating in Federal waters.

In the previous year it had received 14,000 calls for assistance and had responded to 8,600 "in peril" cases, a record number. Boaters needed to be better trained in seamanship and Federal law. At the same time, civilian yachtsmen were pressing

Life Support Investigations. August 18, 2011

As the Life Support Investigations teams coordinator, I am the one who gets the call that there has been another unfortunate diving incident.

The U.S. Coast Guard or sheriff's office has someone's diving equipment that needs inspection to determine if it has malfunctioned.

Over the years, our team of volunteer professionals that also dive Closed Circuit Rebreathers (CCR), have perfected protocols to evaluate diving equipment and the incident that surrounds them in the hope we may find ways to avoid diving injuries.

Our team came out of a Divers Alert Network (DAN) meeting to evaluate CCR fatalities. Since 1960 there have been around 180 deaths while using these life support platforms, but very little was investigated at the time, so there was little known about the cause.

The outcome of the meeting resulted in my invitation to create a protocol to investigate future incidents.

I started with what authorities were currently using. Because the list was extensive, I invited several colleagues to join me in sorting out what may work and what may not. I invited Dr. Joerg Hess (a frequent contributor to this column), who is an engineer, and Dr. Jon Conard, M.D., who practices Emergency Medicine and is a hyperbaric chamber medical officer.

Also asked to assist was Suzanne Floyd, a former Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigator, now teaching criminology at Gulf Coast Community College.

We sorted and debated every step. In the end, we compiled a multi-page document that begins at the dive site with steps to preserve data contained in the equipment, then advises the medical examiner on what to look for if there was a fatality, extends through a performance analysis of the life support technology and finally an analysis of the incident itself from police records.

We were then asked to test the protocols on an old case and found limited success.

After that, agencies began requesting our assistance. Today, our team is organized as a not-for-profit corporation with a few more investigative specialists, including an attorney and two-deep representation (in case of conflict of interest).

What began as research into a protocol to collect better data has developed into a pro bono service to law enforcement. And what have we found?

As in most cases on land, the prevailing contributor to a diving incident is human error.

While there are many contributing factors such as distraction, complacency and poor judgement, one stands out more than the rest: Exceeding ones level of training.

The individual who dives beyond his depth limit faces more unknowns than he is prepared for, unfamiliar technology behaves in an unfamiliar way, and new places (like a cave) cause people to perform in an unsafe manner if you are not trained for it.

There is an old saying common to many high risk activities. There are old divers and there are bold divers, but there are no old, bold divers.

I have taken this experience into our classroom, and used it in lectures, training all levels from basic scuba all the way up to Advanced Rebreather Cave Diving.

We strongly believe in the National Association of Underwater Instructors motto: Safety Through Education.

All of our courses are longer so that we can expose our students to the greater volume of information available.

Diving is relatively safe if you know what you are doing! Editor's Note: This is a repeat of a column from 2011.

Walk with a purpose: Every step matters

What if the steps you take today are part of something far greater than you realize?

For three summers during my youth, I had the opportunity to participate in a walk-athon - a 20-mile walk to benefit the March of Dimes. Different sponsors pledged to pay five, 10, or 20 cents for every mile completed. Along the route, there were checkpoints where our

progress was verified. After the event, we would carry our stamped forms to each sponsor, collect the donations, and turn in the money. Every mile mattered. Every step was accounted for. That walk was more than just exercise; it was a walk with a purpose, a clear, concise

walk toward a goal. Our faith journey should carry that same intentionality. We don't walk aimlessly without meaning. God calls us to walk for Him, every step guided by purpose, even when we don't fully see the destination. Noah walked in obedience long before the rain. Abraham walked away from everything familiar, simply trusting God's promise. Jacob wrestled, limped, and still moved forward. Joseph walked through betrayal, prison, and waiting—but never lost sight of the One who walked with him. Their stories remind us that our steps, although weary, are never wasted (Genesis).

God calls us to walk with purpose; the enemy works hard to pull us off course. Satan doesn't always try to stop our walk outright. Sometimes he distracts, discourages, and causes us to question whether our steps matter at all. He whispers lies like "You're not making a difference," or "You've missed your chance," or "You'll never be enough." Slowly, if we're not careful, our purposeful steps turn into aimless wandering.

Just as Satan convinced Eve to question God's intentions (Genesis 3:1-5) and tempted Jesus in the wilderness, twisting Scripture to shake His identity (Matthew 4:1-11), he still tries to detour our purpose through shame, fear, and delay. Yet our purpose is anchored not in our feelings but in the One who called us, for God remains with us even when we feel forgot-

So, what does it truly mean to walk with unwavering purpose? Jesus provides the perfect example. From the beginning of His ministry, He walked fully aware of where the road would lead. He set His face toward Jerusalem—not by accident, but with divine intention. Jesus knew Calvary awaited Him. Yet love, obedience, and sacrifice marked every step He took. He walked for a purpose—ours.

Even when the weight of what was coming pressed upon Him in Gethsemane 22:42), He did not turn back. Even when betrayal kissed His cheek (Matthew 26:48-50), He kept walking. Jesus chose Calvary with a heart full of mercy and a soul anchored in eternal pur-

Therefore, today, wherever you find yourself on your journey, remember this: every step you take matters. Don't let the enemy steal your purpose or distract you from the path God has set before you. Like Noah, Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, and most of all Jesus, walk with intention, faith, and courage. Trust God completely.

In everything you do, invite Him to guide your steps, and He will lead you straight down the right path. Even when the road is hard and the destination uncertain, God is with you every step of the way-guiding, strengthening, and calling you onward. Your purposeful walk is part of a greater story, and it's never without mean-

"He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)

While contemplating on this I thought of some scripture. "My brethren, count it all joy


