School budget approved

The Wakulla County School Board approved the district's budget and millage for 2025-26 at a special meeting on Monday, Sept. 8.

There were no citizens in attendance at the final public hearing.

The school board unanimously approved a millage rate of 5.427 mills, which represents a tax levy of \$5.42 per \$1,000 of property value before homestead or other exemptions.

The budget, totaling more than \$90.5 million, was also approved unanimouosly.

The first public hearing on the budget was held back in July.

Earlier in the day, the school board held a workshop on numerous proposed policies. The biggest debate was over the issue of school volunteers and whether vetting of volunteers is a matter for the superintendent or the school board to determine.

Superintendent of Schools Rick Myhre said he would take that responsibility, and indicated he felt there should be more vetting of volunteers handling money, such as as stringent level 2 background check for those who work school concession stands and handle the money box.

School Board Chair Cale Langston said he felt a level 2 background check was more appropriate for volunteers with "unsupervised student access" and feared that the more stringent check would lead to a loss of volunteers.

Sopchoppy budget approved

The Sopchoppy City Commission approved the city and water budgets at its regular meeting on Monday, Sept. 8.

The city also received a clean audit for the past fiscal year by Kevin Warren of James Moore & Company. "The health of the city looks good and there have been no findings." Warren said.

The city commission agreed to approve Lynn Artz and fellow Master Gardeners to use arbors at the Sopchoppy Depot Park to place and nurture American Wisteria.

There had been some controversy in the past about vines at the Depot Park.

Councilman Fred McClendon was on the agenda to discuss the Sopchoppy Historic Gym. Although he was not present at the meeting, the Board discussed McClendon's idea of having exclusive rights to the historic gym, marketing it as a venue for weddings and other events. It was projected that each time the venue is rented out, it would bring in \$1,000 for the City of Sopchoppy.



Flower of the Week at Sopchoppy Depot Park

Godfrey's Blazing Star

Among the three Liatris species growing in the northwest garden at Sopchoppy Depot Park, Godfrey's blazing star (Liatris provincialis) is the rarest. Discovered first at Alligator Point, its entire global range is limited to the coastal scrubs and sandhills of southern Wakulla and Franklin Counties. Like other blazing stars, it displays tall narrow bright purple flower stalks in the fall that attract butterflies and native bees. However, the individual flower heads have very short or no stalks and are held at wide angles to the stem. While abundant in places, intensive coastal development and the overgrowth of pines due to fire suppression have destroyed much of its habitat. Considered endangered, its survival may depend ultimately on protected sites at St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Ochlockonee River and Bald Point State Parks.

St. Marks lighthouse keeper's daughter praises city manager's work

Former St. Marks lighthouse keeper's granddaughter, 82-year-old Margaret Bishop, gave a tremendous thank you to City of St. Marks Manager Katherine Gatewood.

"I want to say thank you to Katherine, you are one of the most professional people I have seen. I don't know any of you here (in the meeting), but I have a long history and a strong love for St. Marks, and I like the work you are doing."

Bishop, a former City Clerk for St. Marks, appeared at the city commission meeting on Thursday, Sept. 11.

Gatewood also has ideas to further recreation within St. Marks. City commissioners discussed holding a future workshop to discuss ideas such as pickleball courts, nature/wetlands boardwalks, extending current trails and possibly adding a dock for pickup/drop off of boaters and to accommodate 26-foot boats and larger.

A representative from the Waterfronts committee reported the ticket sales for the upcoming Brewfest event are great with the VIP tickets completely sold out. Volunteers are needed for the event.

The Christmas golf cart parade is slated for Dec.

20th. The event date was coordinated with other municipalities to ensure no overlap occurred.

In other matters:

- The city commission approved a resolution to give a \$5 discount for paperless enrollment for utlities. The goal is to assist in communicating boil water notices more quickly and efficiently through online information dissemination.
- There was discussion about Occupational License and creating new categories such as RV Parks, Real Estate and Fishing Charters. Monies generated will be used for the upkeep of parks and maintenance.
- Gatewood mentioned she is planning a community informational "meet and greet" style event with a bounce house, tables and chairs at the boat ramp with local parties such as the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office, Florida Highway Patrol, Wakulla Fire Rescue, Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and other agencies to inform people about services offered.
- Gatewood also reported a Tallahassee water main break. She also mentioned a lot of meter boxes were hard to find and will be asking homeowners for access to their property to paint the boxes a vibrant color for easier identification and to prevent delays in locating them.

- The water tower in St. Marks was found leaking and the issue was resolved when a valve for the water tower lost electricity with the back up battery ultimately drained. It is now a procedure to monitor this to be quickly resolved in the future.
- · Gatewood informed the meeting that the water meters in St. Marks are smart meters that come factory calibrated with no future calibration needed for 15 years. They are made of marine grade so they can withstand being underwater. If there is a continuous flow for 30 days, the city is alerted.
- · The city commission is exploring ideas and options regarding the working hours of City Hall. Commissioner Sharon Rudd stressed the public should have accessibility to City Hall always and offered to come in and help the office when needed to take some workload off.
- The current state of the bike trail was inquired about by resident Tom Hicks, who said the debris from the last storm needs to be cleaned up and causes a safety issue, and wants to know who is responsible for it.
- St. Marks resident Corey Ingram asked the Board if an overhead projector would be possible in future meetings so the information can be viewed and discussed by citizens.

TALLAHASSEE -Lisa Marie Ezell, 39, of Crawfordville, pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, unlawful possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking offense. The plea was announced by John P. Heekin, United States Attorney for the Northern District of Florida.

Ezell was originally arrested in Wakulla County in July by the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office Quick Reactionary Force after a search warrant at her home. Ezell, who is a convicted felon, was found to be in possession of nearly a pound of methamphetamine, multiple firearms, numerous rounds of ammunition, and over \$8,000 in US Currency. Law Enforcement also located a motorcycle reported stolen out of Wakulla County and automobile reported stolen out of Leon County.

Ezell was arrested and charged in Wakulla County on state charges of Trafficking Methamphetamine over 14 Grams, Possession/

> During the initial search of the property multiple Nazi flags and other gang related items were observed. On the assassination of Charlie Kirk

Editor, The Sun:

I'm old enough to recall the state funerals of Winston Churchill and Dwight Eisenhower. I'm also old enough to recall the political assassinations of JFK and MLK.

The assassination of Charlie Kirk is different yet feels the same.

The aforementioned assassinations, whether state-sponsored or lone wolf or cabal-sponsored, all occurred because someone did not agree with the respective political views. Someone thought the elimination of an individual, because of their political views, was necessary and had an upside. Mr Kirk was assassinated because the opposing position was indefensible and not intellectually competitive. Instead of attempting to compete and debate, the cabal (potentially) felt their only other option was to murder him.

What's different is that, in earlier times, assassinations would make the average citizen recoil at the insanity of the act. I witnessed, as a lad, my extended family praying for the deceased, praying for unity, praying for civility. My mother did not agree, at times, with Uncle Tommy but both prayed together. I don't sense that this time.

The assassination of Charlie Kirk is a pivotal moment in our journey as a society and culture. There doesn't seem to be any restraints on boorish behavior. The senseless act of violence

is heralded by some, public and privately, all because the political views of Charlie Kirk did not align with theirs. As a country, as a society, as a culture we should not accept those boorish behaviors. To accept that behavior is to encourage the behavior and encourage others to engage in random acts of violence.

To reject the boorish behavior begins with you and me. As citizens, we must encourage civil discourse. We must talk. No texting, no emails, we must converse. So what if we differ in our political visions and viewpoints? In talking, with each other, we visualize the humanity, we sense value, we get to know that individual we disagree with. We see the eyes, we hear their voices. Our digital lives strip most of humanity from a conversation.

To discourage further acts of violence means we, as citizens, must reject boorish and clown behavior from the political elite. The vitriol from the Squad, the insane banter from Rep Crockett, the pettiness of McConnell and Schumer, the misrepresentations/lies from Fauxhontas, unacceptable behavior from the former representative of Florida district 1. All this must cease. We must demand nothing less, otherwise we will become inured by more assassinations.

It's up to you and me.





were lined up out the door.

Fr. Smith exclaimed, "The Catholics are coming out of the woodwork!" The most common exclamation we said and heard was: "I didn't know you were Catholic!"

In order to accommodate everyone, Fr. Smith made arrangements for us to use Lee Henderson's Funeral Home Chapel which was located on Hwy. 98, not far from where we are now. Mass and Sunday School classes were held there for the next year.

Fr. Smith was our much loved priest-in-charge until May 30, 1976. On July 12th, 1976, our mission church was officially named St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Mission as our first mass was held on the day of her canonization. We had different visiting priests until Father Paul Hogarty arrived in September. And in October, Fr. Hogarty got permission from the Crawfordville United Methodist Church to use their homecoming church, Zion Hill Methodist which is north of Crawfordville near Bloxham Cutoff.

Blessed Sacrament had been in charge of our mission, but in April 1979, Fr. William Kerr from St. Thomas Moore took charge. Meanwhile, parishioners got together to purchase some land and donated it for a church. This is the land our church sits on right now. Then, Bishop Rene Gracida approved the purchase of the acreage behind us on Hwy. 98 for the future home of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton.

Our first mass on the property was held in May 1980. And the long awaited groundbreaking for the new church building was held in February 1983. Monsignor O'Sullivan, Fr. William Kerr and Fr. Mi-

chael Wever officiated. By the end of the year, we were in our new church.

Bishop J. Keith Symons blessed and dedicated St. Elizabeth Ann Seton on Jan. 8, 1984. Father Robert Miller served as our priest for the next year. In June 1985, Fr. Oscar Sarmiento took over and with his approval, we purchased the land on the corner of Hwy. 98 and St. Frances Street.

A big day came for us in June 1987: We officially became a parish and were no longer a mission church. Fr. William Brown was appointed as our first official pastor and St. Stephen the Protomartyr in Woodville became our mission church. Having a real pastor of our own meant that we needed a place for him to live and so the Rectory Building Committee was formed with Chuck Scott as the contractor.

While the rectory was being built, the cemetery was fast becoming a reality. The land had been cleared. The barn was built. The water lines were going in. The Rectory was finished in September 1988 and in November 1990 the opening dedication of St. Elizabeth Cemetery was held.

Meanwhile our parish continued to grow and it was obvious the outside picnic pavilion was no longer serving our needs. Every time we needed more space or had another project to finance, our parishioners always came through. In fact, we were proud of just how fast we could pay off a mortgage and hold a mortgage burning party. When it came to paying our Catholic Sharing Appeal assessment, we always met and surpassed our CSA goal. So, without worry, our new priest, Fr. James MacGee, put us to work planning a parish social hall which was built and then dedicated in January of 1995 by Bishop John Smith.

Back then, we would have 50 or 60 students signed up for Sunday School. I had been the Reli-

gious Education and Youth Activities Director for our first 20 years. Finding spaces to hold classes was always a problem. Years ago, we had closet like spaces on each side of the altar with accordion doors. The one on the left was used as a sacristy and the one on the right was used as a classroom for a small group of up to six kids. We even turned the rectory garage into a classroom. It was a great relief when we built the Seton Center Social Hall with space for Sunday School classes and room for get-togethers, meals, meetings and indoor activities.

Still, the four new classrooms in the Parish Social Hall filled up quickly and closet space was almost non-existent. It was apparent that we needed another space for classrooms and meetings. The Education Building we have now provides rooms for Religious Education as well as meeting spaces for our Ladies Circle, the Knights of Columbus and an office for our church secretary.

Many of you may not know, but 10 years ago, we did a lot of planning for the growth of our Catholic Community. We formed a Building Committee and developed plans to build a much larger church on our property facing the highway. Not only will it provide much needed room but will also give us more prominent visibility like the other churches in our county. New office spaces, storage, parking lots and play areas were designed. We even created a plan for the eventual conversion of the existing church to meet the growing needs of our parish.

We have come a long way in 50 years. Our parish has risen to the challenges and continued to grow and thrive. It will be so exciting to see what's next for St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first Catholic Church in Wakulla County.





Underwater By Gregg Stanton Wakulla

Jobs in Wakulla County.

December 1, 2011

We all want to create jobs in Wakulla County. But to create jobs, we must provide service or a product

I spend much of my time underwater. When I travel to

dive sites for training to the east and west of Wakulla, I encounter folks from around the world visiting our fair state. In November, I again met with the contingency from Finland, nearly all diving using expensive rebreathers. As before, they inquired on progress opening cave sites in Wakulla County. And again I could not assure them access

to our caves. So they turned the tables on me. In real terms, they bring 10 to 12 people over from Finland (every year) and stay in a house in Fort White. They pay to rent the house for two weeks. All dive every day at dive sites on either side of Wakulla County. They never dive Wakulla County because there is no opportunity to do so.

They spend in the range of \$350 per day for lodging, and about the same in food, eating out every lunch and supper. They purchase diving supplies that average \$170 per day, and vehicle rent and fuel at about the same level per day. And they pay entrance fees to private and public parks that average \$300 per day.

That comes up to an average spending of \$1,340 per day for this party from Finland. At two weeks, the average total is around \$18,760 that this one group from Finland spent in Florida in November.

They gave me a challenge: Find them 10 good dive sites in Wakulla County and they will stay in Wakulla County next November. But to do so will require Wakulla County to provide services to attract them.

The Wakulla Lodge will be pleased to accommodate them at the Park. Their restaurant will be pleased to feed them, as will the many restaurants in Crawfordville, St. Marks, Spring Creek and Panacea. Yes, Wakulla Diving Center will be pleased to provide diving support for these folks. Even the Wakulla County Dive Club will be thrilled to assist.

The big question remains: Will Wakulla Springs State Park be willing to open the park's underwater trails to the public? Of course it should be for a fee.

The Lodge at Wakulla Springs can hire more staff as they will rent more rooms. Indeed, the Lodge will become a much desired diving destination, worthy of travel agency promotion. The local restaurants can hire more servers to accommodate more clients. Our center will hire more staff to service the diving activity.

If Wakulla County can attract one such group each month, each of these activities can hire more staff for the year.

Want more?

Dr. William Huth published a study on the economic potential to opening the Wakulla Springs State Park to equal access cave diving (Huth & Morgan 2011, Journal of Marine Resource Economics). His figures are impressive.

Like the rest of the county's merchants and service providers, I want to hire more staff, I want to see Wakulla County prosper, I want to attract eco-tourism business to our beautiful and sustainable natural resources. And the Wakulla Chamber of Commerce may add a page dedicated to diving in the county, much like they do for kayaking, fishing and hunting.

Can we work on this together?

When we see ourselves as sinners saved by God's incredible grace, maybe we'll stop judging others and aim to be "ever ready to be-



1. COLD WATER **CATASTROPHE**

Every year, cold water rises up from the deep ocean in the Gulf of Panama between January and April. This cold water is full of nutrients and helps feed fish, dolphins, whales, and even protect coral reefs from getting too hot. But this year, scientists were surprised to find that the cold water never showed up. This has never happened before in 40 years of records. The cold water usually rises because of strong winds called trade winds. These winds help push warm water away and make room for the cold water to come up. But this year, the trade winds were much weaker than normal. Scientists are still trying to figure out why, but it may be because of changes in the air and ocean caused by climate change. If the cold water keeps disappearing, it could hurt sea animals and make it harder for coral reefs to survive.
