Depression is one of the most common mental health disorders in the United States, yet it often goes undiagnosed and untreated.

According to the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), an estimated 21 million adults and 5 million youth aged 12 to 17 in the U.S. had at least one major depressive episode in the last year.

Despite its prevalence, many individuals suffer in silence, unaware that what they're experiencing is a treatable condition. This is where depression screening plays a vital role.

Depression can stem from a combination of

genetic predisposition and situational stressors such as family conflict, financial strain, or workplace challenges. Symptoms can range from persistent sadness and fatigue to loss of interest in activities, changes in appetite, and difficulty concentrating.

Because these symptoms can be subtle or mistaken for everyday stress, routine screening is essential for early detection.

Primary care providers (PCPs) are often the first line of defense in identifying depression.

At annual checkups, many PCPs now include depression screening as part of their standard practice. This can involve asking patients about their mood, energy levels, and interest in daily activities, or having them complete a validated questionnaire used to assess depressive symptoms.

Some health care providers have taken this a step further by implementing a collaborative care program that integrates America mental health services directly into primary care. If a patient screens positive for depression, they are connected with a social worker who serves as a depression care manager. A psychiatrist then reviews the case and recommends treatment options, while the social worker continues to follow up with the patient.

This model ensures that individuals receive timely and coordinated care in a familiar setting.

Early intervention is key. Untreated depression can lead to serious consequences, including impaired daily functioning, increased risk of chronic illness, and even suicide.

The NIMH reports that depression is a leading cause of disability worldwide, yet many people delay seeking help due to stigma, lack of awareness, or a shortage of mental health care providers in their area.

Fortunately, other resources are available. Mental Health

America (website: mhanational.org) offers free self-screening tools online, and crisis support is accessible through the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, which can be reached via phone call or text.

October is National Depression and Mental Health Screening Month. If you or someone you know is struggling, do not wait for a "more convenient time" or hope that is just "goes away." Talk to your primary care provider, take a screening test, and explore treatment options. Depression is treatable-and screening is the first step toward healing.

needed dog walkers and volunteers and next I got involved with CHAT (Citizens for Humane Animal Treatment, which later became Paws of Wakulla in April 2015). A year later, CHAT asked me to be on the Board."

Shuff said, "I love animals, I make sure they go to a good home, I give them a good start to be happy and healthy. I used to work shelter adoption events and went to Petco a few times; I loved it."

"I worked with PAWS dog wash for about 15 years now. It occurs two times a year and half the proceeds buy vaccinations and other medicines the shelter needs. We help with TNR which is Trap-Neuter-Release, and we provide food for pets at the Senior Center. The Seniors need the animals, sometimes it's the only companion they have."

Volunteering connects people to their community, and it gives them a sense of fulfillment and makes the community better in so many ways.

"I started working

for Wakulla's Chamber of Commerce about this time and when anyone needed help, I would help. I especially like the ribbon cutting events; I love to see the new businesses start and with the growth in Wakulla, it brings the opportunity to have well paying jobs and it keeps our tax dollars here instead of Tallahassee."

Petra has a long list of volunteer groups she as participated in. "I worked with JoAnn Palmer of the Coastal Clean Up event; I would get up a crew and cook for and feed the workers of the event. I worked Operation Wakulla for a couple of years and now I am at Wakulla Giving Hands."

"I feel rewarded, especially so with the animals because they can't give back, I don't want a thanks from them because I do it from my heart."

Petra shared, "Volunteering for the community, it's rewarding to help people that can't help themselves or fallen on hard times, even if it's just temporary."

"It is special to work for Wakulla Giving Hands for the Seniors who are stuck at home without a ride. Because we are putting the bags together for them, we don't get to deliver and actually see them, but we make sure they get what they need and that it is healthy. I enjoy participating in the Senior Center's Christmas After Dark events to benefit Wakulla's seniors."

Petra was born in a small town in Germany and then lived in St. Petersburg, Fla. before finally moving to Crawfordville.

"It was a huge culture shock for me, I am used to seeing pink, green and yellow houses from St. Pete. I guess it took me a little time to really fit in in Wakulla. The 16 years I worked at the Chamber, I met all the great people here. It was Ms. Sharol Brown who really welcomed me here; she was like my second mother. I was shy working at the Chamber, but after getting to know everyone, I became outgoing. It was the warm hellos and the front line welcomes and I needed to be informative and know what's going on in the community. I made a lot of friends."

Married to her husband John, and has a son Shane House, Petra likes to cook, bake sourdough bread, knit and crochet scarves and hats.

Shuff's latest volunteer event was in September with a Jam Pop-up Sale at Posey's to benefit Wakulla Giving Hands.

"We are making jams and cowboy candy out of whatever fruit we can find, and we keep adding stuff. It's good stuff; I want to thank Sherrie Posey for letting us set up."

Event after retirement, Petra is still active volunteering in the community.

"Now that I am retired, it gives me the opportunity to volunteer more during the week as it was restricted to evenings and weekends while I was working," she says.



you take any action leaving or changing your situation – drop the negativity first. Any action is better than no action, especially if you have been stuck in an unhappy situation for a long time. If you remain stuck you learn nothing. If it is fear remember all fear stands for is "Future Events that Appear Real." Doing cuts the link between fear and your thinking.




# The Old Magnolia cemetery

#### By Elizabeth Smith, originally published in the October 1963 issue of The Magnolia Monthly

The old Magnolia Cemetery near Newport is a true historical curiosity. As cemeteries go it may not be old in time, but for a locality in which artifacts vanish in less than a century because of the climate, it is ancient indeed. The Magnolia cemetery is just such a victim. It was used by the citizens of Magnolia, 5 miles up the river from St. Marks. The town of Magnolia, which was founded in 1826 and flourished for 20 years, had a larger population during its prime than any town now in existence in Wakulla County. It had a bank, a newspaper, two hotels, and a long wharf on the St. Marks River fronted by warehouses to which schooners and packets

"Farewell dear husband My life is past My love for you Thru life did last/Now after me no sorrow take But love my mother for my

A few months later her remaining child, only 14 months old, followed her. This was James Levi, born May 27, 1856, died July 23, 1857. On his headstone are engraved:

"Dearest son, thou has left me Here thy loss I deeply feel/But tis God that hath bereft me He can all my sorrow heal/Yet again I hope to meet thee When the day of life is fled/Then in Heaven I hope to greet thee Where no farewell tear is shed"

The father, James W. Skipper, was the last person to be buried in the cemetery. He was born March 31, 1822, and died November 12, 1869. Though his wife died 12 years previously, his epitaph reads as follows (it is believable that a second wife was responsible for these words, tho he is buried alongside his first plot is the grave of Ella

"Dearest Husband Thou has left me And thy loss I deeply feel/ But it's God that has bereft me He can all my sorrows heal"

The inscription is the same as that for the son, James Levi, tho shortened, and may have been chosen not by a wife but by an uninspired stone cutter who only imagined that the wife would have this said of her husband. But history is full of guesses.

The fourth and largest plot behind the other three is that of the Ladd family, about whom much had been recorded in Newport's history. Ladd descendants still live there. Daniel Ladd, the pre-Civil War merchant and shipper was probably the richest man Wakulla County ever produced, tho his fortune, like many others in the south, the battle.

The first stone inside this fenced plot is that of Missie C. Scott, relationship to the Ladds is not known. She died June 27, 1859, age 15.

In a far corner of the

Ladd, died May 29, 1856, age 15 months. A slab over her crypt has a broken corner. When it is raised it reveals a pit of white sand and some scurrying mice. And beneath her name:

"Rest dearest one from earthly ills, Thine early doom thy Father wills,

This He who will forever say Come, Ella dear, I am the way"

In the opposite corner from Ella's grave are two other headstones close together and nearly buried in the debris. They are hard to read because they face a fence less than 2 feet away and their inscriptions are felt rather than seen. One is that of Joseph Ladd of Augusta, Maine, who died Aug. 19, 1835, at the age of 49. According to a book on the Hamlin family owned by Fred was dissipated with Ladd of Newport, this man died of yellow fever. An inscription at the top of his headstone could not be deciphered and my have been only a decoration. Beneath was this poem:

> "But man, weak

man, is born to die, Made up of guilt and vanity/Thy dreadful sentence, Lord, was just, Return ye sinners to your dust"

The gloom of this epitaph was not mitigated by the hard work it took to feel out the words or to rub paper and pencil over them to bring out this doleful message. But the fact that the sinners were returned to dust can be verified anywhere in the cemetery.

The tombstone so close to this one and leaning badly is that of another Ladd, possibly the son, Joseph E. Ladd, also of Augusta, Maine, who died August 21, 1856 (or '59, since the number was hard to decipher).

This leaves only one other tombstone, the last in the Ladd plot and possibly the oldest intact headstone in Wakulla County. It was that of Weld Hamlen (or Hamlin), one of the five sons of Theophilos Hamlin of Augusta, who first shipped to New Orleans in 1816, and from there came to Florida when the territory opened up in 1821. Altho all the brothers did not come to Newport, they were the founders of Magnolia about 1826, for they bought land along the west bank


of the St. Mark's River and settled the site, even tho speculators in St. Marks hoped to entice these Yankee merchants to buy inflated property around the fort. Weld's grave is the only recorded Hamlin tomb and the red sandstone with his name was probably brought down from the New England states on one of the schooners owned by his brothers.

It was the sister of these boys, Sarah Hamlin, who married Joseph Ladd, only the first of many intermarriages throughout both families that brought the Ladds to Florida.

What does this old plot tell us of the people other than what the headstones say? Not one of the people lived even to the age of 50. Only one of the children, Missie Scott, lived beyond the age of 5. Why did they die at an early age? Malaria? Yellow fever? (Only are we sure Josehp Ladd died this way). No medical facilities?

From the first to the last of the recorded burials, the cemetery was used for 40 years, from 1829 to 1869. But in a few more years even the rusted fences and mildewed stones will disappear, for they are retreating further and further into the mould, the dead leaves, and the
