Wakulla Transportation is out

It appears Big Bend Transit will take over the ride service that had been under the senior center for 35 years

After 35 years of operating the county transportation service, the Wakulla Senior Citizens Center appears to be about to hand it over to Big Bend Transit.

And it is not doing so willingly.

At a meeting of the county's Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board on Wednesday, officials with the senior center derided the Request for Proposal process under

the Apalachee Regional Planning Commission that selected Big Bend Transit.

Senior Center Executive Director Lara Edwards questioned the validity of the process, and while the center initially considered filing a formal protest, it decided against spending \$13,000 to post a bond to challenge the decision.

After the meeting, John Shuff, chair of the senior center's board, said Wakulla Transportation is a small

non-profit that's barely getting by and didn't have the \$13,000 to post to pursue a protest.

At the meeting Shuff went through the score-sheets of the three judges, and he claimed the scoring appeared to be biased against Wakulla and for Big Bend Transit.

"Was this process set up to evaluate or exclude?" he asked.

The coordinating board, with three members abstaining, voted 4-3 to reject ARPC's recommendation of Big Bend Transit. The board

actually has very little say over the contract since it is only an advisory board. The matter will go before the regional board and state for approval.

Barring something unforeseen, it is expected that Big Bend Transit will take over the service in June.

Even as Lara Edwards warned of the impact of losing 13 long-term jobs, eight vehicles and 600 to 700 long-term clients, Shawn Mitchell, the general manager at Big Bend Transit, coun-

tered that the service is "actually looking to add jobs, to build upon what Wakulla Transportation has built."

"I'm looking to partner," Mitchell added. "I want to be a friend. I'm not a big city take-over guy" as some had characterized Big Bend Transit.

Austin Britt, the Transportation Disadvantaged Program Coordinator for ARPC, disputed the characterization of the bid process as unfair.

"It was a fair process,"

he said, noting that two of the three judges were from Wakulla County. "Due diligence was done."

Britt also noted Wakulla had an opportunity to protest the selection, but that time had now passed.

The ARPC has a meeting set in Tallahassee on Thursday, March 26 to review the bids. Senior center officials plan to attend to again challenge the decision.

A final decision on the matter is set for a meeting on April 8th.

Mike Kemp case is continued until April

Kemp's attorney indicates he will file motion to dismiss charges against former commissioner

While former county commissioner Mike Kemp had been on the trial docket for March when the case was under Wakulla Circuit Judge Layne Smith, the case has been under review by Circuit Judge Ron Flury, who was assigned the case after Judge Smith removed himself.

At a hearing on March 12 via Zoom, Judge Flury got an update on the case from Crawfordville attorney David Kemp (no relation to Mike Kemp) that transcripts of depositions had been ordered and a likely Motion to Dismiss would be drafted.

Attorney David Kemp was standing in for attorney Stephen Webster at the hearing. The two attorneys often work together. David Kemp was attorney for Becky Whaley, a co-defendant of Mike Kemp's, who took a deferred prosecution offer to avoid trial. A

County to review offer of school property

Wakulla County Administrator David Edwards said the county would review the offer by the school board to give the county the Wakulla Education Center property in Shadeville.

Edwards told commissioners at their March 16 meeting that the county needs to do due diligence on the offer – determine what shape the old school buildings are in, what it would cost to maintain the facility, and other issues. Edwards said the county might need to re-negotiate the school board's offer.

Superintendent of Schools Rick Myhre closed the Wakulla Education Center last year and moved Pre-K students to elementary schools closing the facility as a school site.

The school has a rich history: It was known as Shadeville School and was the black high school until Wakulla high schools were combined for racial integration in 1967 with the construction of Wakulla High School.

The district was approached by the Wakulla Christian Coalition, which wanted to preserve the school and have a history museum.

But Myhre said after initially considering the coalition, he questioned turning over a piece of local property valued at \$1.2 million to a local nonprofit and whether that was the best use.

A week before the county commission meeting,

the school board approved offering the property to the county to use for much-needed ballfields and gymnasium space. Part of the offer was also to give special permission to the coalition to use the facilities for its programs and needs.

The coalition appeared at that March 9 school board meeting asking members not to move forward with the offer to the county.

At the county commission meeting, Edwards said he had met with and discussed the issue with coalition members as well as Superintendent Myhre.

Commission Chairman Ralph Thomas thanked the school board for the opportunity to use the property.

There was an understanding that the commission would move forward on the offer exploring its options.

A third defendant in the case, Deputy Don Newsome, represented by attorney Don Pumphrey, recently accepted a deferred prosecution agreement as well.

It's not clear at this point what Webster intends to argue in a proposed motion to dismiss.

Judge Flury, who was chief prosecutor in Wakulla for a time before being appointed to the bench several years ago, set the Kemp case for further review in April.

The charges stem from incidents in May

2024 when Kemp and Whaley, former administrator of the Wakulla Citizens Facebook page, were attempting to out an internet troll known as "Thunder Lightning" (sic) by using voter registration records and mistakenly named the wrong person.

The troll had posted comments critical of Kemp and Whaley on Facebook, and had also made a post complaining about a white truck in a parking lot nearly hitting his wife. Kemp had Newsome look up the case, but instead came up with a different case with similar facts. County Commissioner

Ralph Thomas used WebElect, a site for use by candidates to allow them to contact registered voters for political activity, such as canvassing and mailers, and gave the name to Kemp.

On May 6, Whaley sent a text message to Kemp that read: "Tell me Thunder guy's real name about to bust him out." Kemp sent her the WebElect information on the person.

Whaley posted on Wakulla Citizens page

the WebElect printout of the name, birth date, mailing address, voter ID number and party affiliation of the person, with a post: "Introducing Thunder Lightning to you all from public records, registered to vote in 2022 according to the records and data shows he's never voted! ... Show your face and own your truth. You still have time to register to run for office!"

It was not the person behind the Thunder Lightning account.

The wrongly identified person requested that Whaley take down the post, but Whaley initially declined.

The next day, May 7, 2024, at 6:38 a.m., the victim called the sheriff's office to file a complaint. A deputy arrived around 7:30 a.m.

Apparently hearing about it, Kemp called Newsome around 8:20 a.m., and Newsome, on his day off, went into the sheriff's office management system and

accessed information about the victim and provided it to Kemp.

Around 8:45 a.m., Kemp drove by the victim's house while the deputy was there taking the report - Kemp's truck was captured on the deputy's body camera. That is the basis for the tampering with a witness charge, that Kemp went by the victim's house and intended to talk with him.

HOME ON THE RANGE

A gun for the new or elderly shooter

allow the magazine to come out, then try to pull out the magazine. No dice. I pull harder. Nope. Can't move it. Drat.

"May I take this gun home with me for a day?" I ask her. "It needs some work, and I don't have the tools here."

"Of course." She's happy to have this problem solved.

I bring the gun home, and wrestle with that darn magazine. Nope. Won't come out. It'll need more strength than I have.

"Joe!" I call. "Can you get the magazine out of this gun?"

He takes the gun, and tries to push back the lever and yanks at the magazine. Well, he would have yanked, but it doesn't do any good. That magazine is stuck fast.

"This is really jammed," he mutters. Finally, he pushes very hard. Now able to release the magazine, he unloads the gun.

"The lubricant here has jelled. It froze the heel lock in place." He cleans out the remains of the lubricant. "Even with the jell gone, this is a difficult magazine to get out of the gun. Many older guns are not so well new-shooter-oriented. They were engineered to function, but not to be easy to use for a new shooter."

Well, I'm secretly glad he had troubles taking out the magazine, too, but fortunately he's a whole lot stronger than I am.

Even when it is un-

stuck, I find it very difficult to operate the magazine lock. If I find it hard, imagine how an elderly woman will manage?

Pulling back the slide, I find it is also very tight and hard to manage. The gun is small, and it is a .40-caliber handgun. It will have a lot of recoil. This is not the gun for an elderly lady. Many of the older handguns had heavy trigger pulls and rudimentary sights too.

Unloaded, cleaned and newly lubricated, I return the gun to the lady.

"Should I keep this gun?" she asks. "I've been thinking that maybe I need to learn to use this gun for my own safety."

"You could certainly learn to shoot. There are classes nearby with qualified teachers. Or, you may know someone who is very knowledgeable. But I wouldn't keep this particular gun. It's difficult to manipulate. Newer handguns will have features that make them much easier to use."

"So, if I do take a handgun course, I'll want to purchase a new gun. How do I know I won't get ripped off, or if someone

will sell me a gun that is too difficult for me to use?"

"That's a great question," I reply. "First, buy locally. This is important, because when you need accessories or anything else gun-related, these people will want your continued business. Even more important, my experience here has shown that our local gun shop owners will hear what you say you need, and they will sell you an appropriate gun."

"My girlfriend has a gun she likes to shoot, but she says she can't take it apart to clean. Don't you have to clean out shooting residue in a gun? What if I find a gun I like, but it's too difficult to take it apart?"

"It sure is better to find a gun that you can manage yourself, but if you do get your hands on a gun that is easy to shoot, has good sights, low recoil and a good grip but is difficult to take apart... If you really want that gun, the local shop owners will point you to someone who can clean your gun on a regular basis."

"Isn't that going to be

expensive?"

"It's not very expensive. And, if this gun might be in the position to save your life, you'll think it is well worth a few dollars to keep it clean!"

"Since we've been talking, I'm learning about other things I'll need to shoot at a range. For example, you said something about an UpLula. What's that and do I need one?"

"An UpLula is an accessory which can make loading your magazine easy. Depending on the gun you choose, you may want an UpLula."

"I'll need to buy hearing and sight protection," she adds. "And a bag to carry my stuff in. And targets."

"Yes. You do need all those."

"Where do I go to shoot? I hear there are shooting ranges nearby, but they cost money. My friend said I can shoot in a range in the national forest for free. Is that a good idea?"

"No!" It's frightening to think of a newbie or anyone else shooting at the forest range. Joe and I went a couple times.

Shooters there don't necessarily follow range rules. Some shooters are well-informed and follow guidelines you'd expect at a range, but some do not.

"I don't want to take a chance. Where do you go that's safe?" she wonders.

"Joe and I go to the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office range. There is always a deputy at the front desk. If you're new to the range, he'll go over basic range rules with you and make sure you understand them. It's reassuring to know there is always a deputy at this range. The cost is reasonable: \$75 a year. You can go out often except for Sundays and Mondays. And a few days are set aside for training purposes and holidays. It's a very good deal."

"So, you really think I should buy locally and shoot locally?"

"Yes, I do. You'll get a fair deal and you'll be safe."

PORCELAIN CRAB (*Petrolisthes armatus*)

This tiny animal (<1/2") lives in high densities in Gulf coast inter/subtidal oyster reefs and rock rubble habitats. It filter feeds tiny organisms from water, including larval oysters. Some scientists think this animal is not native to Florida and was imported from Brazil in ballast water. If so, it might have a devastating effect on oyster beds. Others disagree, saying it is native. It is actually more closely related to lobsters than crabs.

BIRDING AT THE REFUGE

Spring at the refuge

"But life is change, that is how it differs from the rocks, change is its very nature."—John Wyndham in *The Chrysalids*, 1955.

It was clear cold and windy the other night and the levee gate at St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge was coated with a light glaze of ice. When I had come through the same gate two weeks before, frogs were calling and it was 30 degrees warmer. Soras and a Least Bittern called as I made my way out to my listening spot and waited for sunrise.

I listened to a pair of Barred Owls hooting in a cypress swamp on the edge of the marsh and watched as a silhouetted Osprey flew in to a nest in the bare top of a dead cypress.

A few minutes later, a second Osprey flew in from the opposite direction and landed beside it. The first bird, a male judging by its slightly smaller size, flew up 10 feet and fluttered in the air with its legs dangling before settling back down. This was an

abbreviated version of the Sky-Dance, a male Osprey's mating display.

With the dawn came a flight of waders, mostly Little Blue and Tricolored Herons.

We have gone from unseasonably warm to unseasonably cold, but Spring is unfolding and hot weather awaits us.

Lilies are blooming; Zephyr Lilies on the roadside and white waterlilies in the refuge ponds. Willow and Yaupon are in full flower. Parula warblers are paired up and feeding in the newly unfurled oak leaves at the Double Bridges. Swallow-tailed Kites are cruising along the canopy there and will soon be nesting.

Every day brings some new record of a first-Spring bird sighting. This week I have seen my first Eastern Kingbird perched high on a dead branch and my first Ruby-throated Hummingbird feeding on thistles.

Most of our wintering ducks are gone. They stayed late this year, which surprised me.

February was cold and snowy

across Canada and the northern tier of states, but I had anticipated that ducks would start staging northward on schedule. Their numbers stayed at winter levels until the first week in March when they dropped by 75% in a few days. This week, I found only 287 ducks of six species on the interior ponds.

Two thirds of the remaining ducks were teal, mostly Blue-wings. Green-winged Teal numbers are dwindling as ducks that have wintered at the refuge leave. Blue-winged Teal numbers are variable from day-to-day as wintering birds leave and are replaced by northbound migrants coming up from South America.

Shorebirds are also beginning to move. Our drought has increased the area of open mudflats on the interior ponds leading to the best shorebird winter in the 10 years that I have been doing the refuge shorebird surveys.

Shorebird numbers peaked at just over 5,200 birds in late January and have now dropped to around 3,000 birds.

Obscured within

the shifting numbers are species shifts. Our wintering western Willets are beginning to leave and I have seen a few of the returning eastern Willets that will breed at the refuge. The first of the Black-necked Stilts has returned and wintering Marbled Godwits have suddenly disappeared.

St. Marks is always changing. On the short-term, there are the lunar and tidal cycles. Annually, there are cycles that include leafing, fruiting and blooming for plants; breeding and raising of young, for animals and the migration of birds.

All of this is overlaid by seasonal shifts in temperature and rainfall, by occasional hurricanes or drought and by the slow climactic shift to a warming earth.

It is mid-March at St. Marks and Spring is happening in a way that is both familiar and yet different from all the Springs before. Come down and see for yourself.

Underwater Wakulla

There is nobility when people work toward a common cause, and shame when they seek conflict as resolution to differences.

In this column I have tried to document when people came together to build our counties artificial reefs, the Underwater Crime Scene Investigation Protocols, the Academic Diving Program at FSU and even a protective fish community nested on a patch reef in the ocean.

I will continue to report on such activities, provide historic perspective and some humor I hope, in anticipation of the day when we can all recognize the contributions of everyone to the preservation and wise exploitation of our beautiful Wakulla County.

I am a marine biologist by profession. My passion is science, the observation of creatures, including humans, and in particular, occupants of the aquatic realm. Since retirement from FSU, I have continued teaching the technology that permits humans to spend great amounts of time underwater.

In the last two years I have also become an investor, purchasing the resources that enables us to spend quality time underwater.

As an investor in this county, I have become more aware of the economic plight facing us all. Rather than sit back and ignore our plight, I support the preservation and wise exploitation of our resources such as water, forest and clean air, the very reasons I chose to raise a family here.

When I moved to this area in the mid 70s, we already had identified the sinkholes of Wakulla as prime recreation, training and research sites. I met and began a long relationship with Ken McDonald of the Tallahassee Police Department because of the number of cars and other stolen property our students reported.

This was back when Wakulla Springs belonged to Ed Ball, and Cherokee was the very popular public weekend swimming hole. During the summer, families would bring their dogs, kids and air mattresses, complete with drinks, to float out in that cool sink. On weekdays we surveyed the floor, and trained for research held elsewhere, such as the Antarctic, Palau and the Florida Keys.

Then Wakulla Springs was purchased by the State of Florida. With the later purchase of local sinkholes by the park, in an attempt to protect them from illegal dumping and their water from pollution, public use was curtailed, driving us out of the county to the east (Mayo and High Springs area), and the west (Marianna and Ponce de Leon area).

Several years ago, the Wakulla County Dive Club formed around a preservation and safety mandate to re-open dive sites to the public. And two years ago they and others began the campaign to open Wakulla Springs to diving.

This week, a new dive shop reportedly called Cave Connections, will open in Wakulla County in anticipation of increased cave diving revenue.

And where am I in all of this?

I anticipate that I will be writing about the noble story of Wakulla County's public recovery and continued protection of its water resources from the deck of my sailboat in the next few years.

Jesus could have said, 'Not Your will, but Mine.'

The message of Good Friday is sobering – and so, so powerful:

Jesus chose to die for us. He willingly gave His life to pay the price for the sins we have committed.

Did you notice the words “chose,” “willingly” and the convicting

ending, “for the sins we have committed” (emphasizing “we”)? (More about this later.)

What if Jesus had refused to allow Himself to be nailed to a cross?

How would this have affected your life – not to mention your eternity?

Long before the garden of Gethsemane, before Jesus was betrayed and arrested, He already knew every horrible detail of the torture He’d face in the coming hours.

Filled with dread, Jesus asked His Father to “remove this cup from Me.” He felt such anguish that He sweated drops of blood, a telling medical condition called hema-

tidrosis, which occurs under extreme mental or physical stress. The Amplified Bible supports this by saying Jesus was “[deeply distressed and anguished; almost to the point of death]” (Luke 22:44).

He knew there was no other way to break Satan’s hold over God’s people. Because of His deep love for us, He submitted to His Father, saying, “Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done” (Luke 22:42 ESV).

But ... what if Jesus had said “no”? What if He had decided we weren’t that important to Him

after all?

How different would our lives be today if God’s love had not planned for our salvation so long ago?

Imagine if Satan were left undefeated. Cruelty, selfishness and every ugly sin would have abounded even more than we see today. Think Pottersville (only worse) in “It’s a Wonderful Life,” where everyone began living for himself once Mr. Potter took over the town.

How long would love have survived, especially sacrificial love? Would light have eventually been swallowed up in darkness?

Would all human life

have become totally devalued?

Him repeatedly on the head” (Matthew 27:30 AMP). After long hours of ridicule and torture, the soldiers led Jesus to an excruciatingly painful and gruesome death.

Jesus could have said, “Not Your will, but mine.”

But He didn’t, because we are that important to Him.

The porcheside lesson

Being a native Floridian, one grows accustomed to unpredictable weather as winter fades into spring. One day may end in the 80s, only to be followed by a morning in the 30s. When warm and cold air collide, storms often brew. My dad and I would stand on the back porch and watch the storm clouds roll in just like we had so many eve-

nings. There was something fascinating about the changing horizon.

Sometimes, when we were near the coast, Dad would look toward the clouds and say, “Batten down the hatches.” It was his way of saying it was time to prepare for the storm. Other times he would simply call it a “30-minute storm.” That meant from the moment the first cloud appeared, the whole thing would pass through in about half an hour. And the funny thing is — he was almost always right.

Standing there, I learned something about storms from my father. Life carries uncertainty, and trials are part of this world. The struggles we face are not always

made of wind and rain. Sometimes they come as worry, loss, disappointment, or seasons that test our faith. Some test our endurance only for a short time, much like a 30-minute storm.

The disciples experienced a storm like that on the Sea of Galilee. The wind rose and the waves crashed over the boat, and they feared for their lives. Yet with a single word Jesus spoke, “Peace, be still,” and the sea grew calm as the wind and the waves obeyed the Lord (Mark 4:35-41).

Then, with the proverbial flip of a coin, harder storms blow in, requiring us to hold steady and ride out circumstances we cannot control.

In those moments the Word of God becomes our beacon. God promises to be with us in the rough waters and that the rivers will not overwhelm us (Isaiah 43:2). The psalmist reminds us that God is our refuge and strength in times of trouble. Even when the ground beneath us crumbles, we need not fear because He holds us.

Scripture gives us a powerful picture of this kind of faith in the life of the Apostle Paul. While under arrest and being taken to Rome to stand trial, Paul found himself in the middle of a violent storm at sea. For days the winds raged and the sailors feared for their lives. Yet Paul remained

calm. While others panicked, he stood steady, trusting the God who held both the wind and the waves. Even in the middle of the storm, Paul knew that God had not abandoned them and was already guiding them safely toward shore (Acts 27).

Like Paul, in both physical and spiritual storms we are called to stay anchored in God.

We pray a little more, lean a little harder on Scripture, and seek after Him. Some pass quickly, while others require us to hold steady. But in every trial we place our hope in the One who created us and holds us safely through it all.

When I think about storms, my mind often

returns to those evenings on the porch with my dad. It is in those quiet memories that I still remember standing beside him, watching the clouds roll in across the horizon. Back then he was teaching me how to read the weather, but along the way he was also teaching me how to trust God in the storms of life.

He brought them out of their distress. He stilled the storm to a whisper; the waves of the sea were hushed – Psalm 107:28b-29.

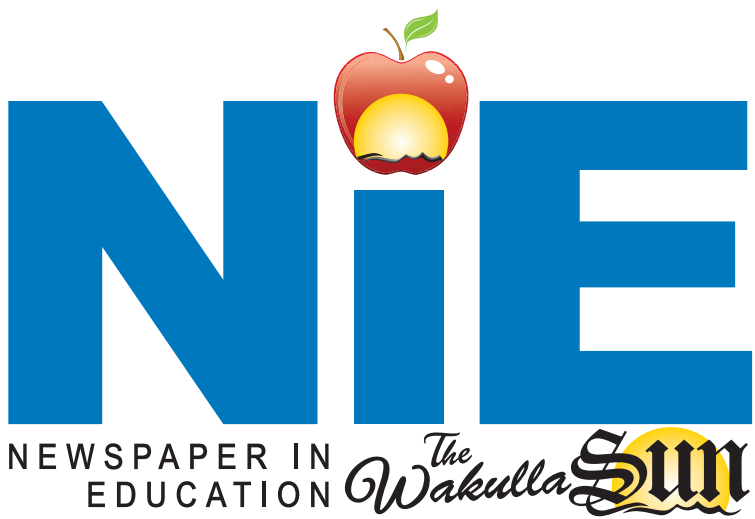

1. NEW YORK CITY CELEBRATES RAMADAN WITH ITS FIRST MUSLIM MAYOR

Many Muslims in New York City said Ramadan felt extra special this year because the city has its first Muslim mayor, Zohran Mamdani. During the holiday, he visited many different groups across the city to pray, share meals, and break his fast with them at iftar dinners. These gatherings included firefighters, taxi drivers, teachers, children, and many other Muslim communities. For many people, seeing the mayor take part in Ramadan made them feel proud, seen, and included. At the same time, the holiday came during a hard season because many families were also worried about war, Islamophobia, and loved ones around the world. Even so, shared meals and time together helped people feel comfort, faith, and community. Create a short invitation for a community meal that welcomes people from many different backgrounds. Write a title for your event and 3 to 5 sentences explaining what the event is, what guests can expect, and how it will bring people together. End with one sentence explaining how your event helps people feel included and comfortable.

2. SRI LANKA ADDS A SURPRISE WEEKLY HOLIDAY

Sri Lanka's government announced that every Wednesday would be a public holiday for now because the country is trying to save fuel during an energy shortage. Fuel shipments have been delayed, and the government is worried there will not be enough gasoline and oil for everyone. While some people understood why the rule was made, many were unhappy because shops and restaurants lost business, students missed school, and drivers had trouble making money. The government also limited how much fuel people could buy each week and made special rules about which days different cars could refuel. Some people canceled trips because they were afraid of running out of fuel far from home. This public holiday is a creative solution to a

challenging problem. What creative ways can you think of that a community – or even a whole country – could save on fuel for a short time? It could be as simple as helping more people walk or bike to school or work, or something bigger like the public holiday in Sri Lanka. Describe what your idea is, how it would help people use less fuel, and how you would share your idea with people to get them to participate.

3. BASEBALL TRIES ROBOT HELP FOR BALLS AND STRIKES

Major League Baseball is using a new system that lets players challenge certain ball and strike calls during games. The system uses technology to check whether a pitch was real-

ly a ball or a strike, and only the batter, catcher, or pitcher can ask for a review. Each team gets two challenges, and if a team is right, it keeps the challenge. Supporters think this could help fix important missed calls and make games fairer. But the new system could also change how hitters, pitchers, catchers, and umpires do their jobs because the strike zone may be called a little differently than before. Some people are excited about the change, while others think it may cause confusion or arguments. Imagine your class is deciding whether to use technology to help settle disagreements in games or competitions. Write 3 classroom rules for how the technology should be used fairly. Then write a short

paragraph explaining one good thing about using technology and one reason people might still want humans to make the final call sometimes.

4. A METEOR FLASHES ACROSS THE SKY

A bright meteor streaked across the sky over parts of the Northeastern United States and made a loud boom that people could hear and feel in northern Ohio. NASA said the space rock was about 6 feet wide and weighed about 7 tons before it broke apart. It sped through the sky at about 45,000 miles per hour and exploded over Ohio. The blast caused shaking and loud sounds that scared many people, and police got lots of calls about what seemed like an explosion. People in many states and even Canada reported seeing the fiery streak.

Scientists said pieces may have fallen as meteorites in an area near Medina County, Ohio. Draw a four-box comic strip showing what happened when the meteor crossed the sky. In each box, add a caption that tells one part of the event, such as people noticing the bright light, hearing the boom, calling for help, and scientists explaining what happened. Under your comic, write 2 facts you learned about the meteor from this story.

5. THE "WAX BROS" HELP PARALYMPIC SNOWBOARDERS GO FAST

At the Winter Paralympics, wax technicians help snowboarders by putting special wax on their boards so they glide better on snow. For Team USA, two techs named Phil Fell and Jon Haaversen

carefully tested many waxes to find the best one for changing snow conditions. The work is tricky because snow can feel different depending on the weather, the sunlight, and the time of day. The wax techs keep many of their methods secret because the right wax can make a big difference in a close race. Athletes said the techs are very important because the wrong wax can make a board feel slow, while the right wax can help win medals. Their job takes teamwork, science, careful testing, and quick thinking. Think of a sport, hobby, or activity where people need help from others behind the scenes, such as coaches, mechanics, costume makers, or equipment helpers. 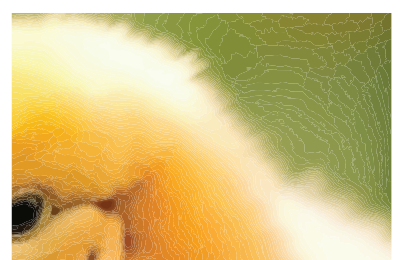
